If you listen to the news media Lake St. Clair has apparently dropped to historically low levels, 0 with no end in sight and we'll soon be able to 0 walk over to Canada. Or has it? Let's take a look 0 at the data. 0 I should start by saying; I am an eternal 0 optimist, so I am literally taking a "glass is half 0 full" view on this issue. It's just the Wind! Well not quite, but the wind does play a role in our perception of falling lake

levels. Our lake is very shallow and the lake level
 can change by as much as a foot, simply by a

sustained wind from the West. The wind will

literally blow the water to the other side of the


lake. Check out the water levels after we've had a

directly to the levels of the Great Lakes to our North and West. It's Chicago, They're Stealing our Water! It is true that about 340 billion gallons of Great Lakes water each year is diverted through the Chicago Diversionary and Ship Canal. Seems like a lot huh? Well, not so much. The Great Lakes have over 6 quadrillion (with a Q) gallons of water, that is 6,000,000,000,000,000. So 340 billion gallons is literally a drop in a very large bucket.

The truth is, there is also a lot of water diverted INTO the great lakes. "The truth of the matter is that diversions add more to the Great Lakes than they remove," said Adam Fox, a water resources planner with USACE.

The Ogoki and Long Lac diversions, which divert water from Hudson Bay into the Great Lakes, pour more water into Lake Superior than the Lake Michigan diversion at Chicago and the New York Barge Canal

diversion, located between Lakes Erie and Ontario, take out of the lakes. (Source: voicenews.com, 12/7/2012).

Natural Cycles. Most scientists agree that what is more likely at play here is just a natural cycle. The lake levels are driven by the amount of evaporation and the amount of precipitation that occurs. If we have a very cold winter, the ice pack on the water reduces evaporation. Who remembers the 1980's when we were putting sandbags along Lakeshore to keep the rising lake back (1986 had the highest recorded monthly average)? In the 1920's and 1930's the lakes were much lower than they are now (you can see the data at our website at: www.gpfbc.com/waterlevels.

So my approach is to not panic, open another cold one on the deck of my boat and sit back and enjoy the water. Now if the darn fuel prices...



### NEW RENEWAL POLICY

As you know the boat club is an all-volunteer organization, and we collect a modest \$50 in annual dues from each member family (\$35 for singles). This money is used to cover some of the basic costs of running the club, including insurance, and food and refreshments at various events. The board works hard at keeping costs down, and I hope you agree that the \$50 or \$35 in annual dues is one of the best values around. You need to only participate in one of our major events to recoup your investment.

In the past the club had each member family on a unique renewal date. This made the collection of dues a year-round process. In order to simplify the renewal process, we are moving everyone to a May 1 renewal date. As part of this process we are giving everyone full credit for dues that have been paid (rounded to the end of their renewal month) and prorating the renewals to get everyone on a May 1 date.

You should have received a renewal invoice by May 1. Please pay soon if not already done so we can update our database. We have also implemented the option to pay on Paypal instead of sending us a check.
