Boater's Corner By Scott Bade, GPF Boat Club Membership Chairman & Past Commodore

This is a first in a series of articles on boating. The plan is for this column to be about the boating lifestyle. It will contain information for boaters and non-boaters. When people find out I have a boat, they have mixed reactions. Some view boating as an expensive hobby that people are thrilled to get out of. We've all heard the old saying about the "two happiest days in a boater's life—the day they got their boat, and the day they sold their boat." To me these are not "real" boaters. They describe people that probably should not have gotten a boat in the first place. I have sold several boats over the years, but only to make room for another boat.

Real boaters are people that love to be on the water, love the lifestyle, and/or they love the challenge of tending to, and improving their vessel. Sailors in particular will get this gleam in their eye when they talk about skimming silently across the water

harnessing the wind and their skills. Power boaters are a little different breed, which fall into a few broad categories.


Living in a Boating Paradise

We are fortunate to live next to Lake St. Clair. Our lake has it all—great sailing, and wonderful power boating destinations. To me, one of the greatest attributes is the fact that we're connected to the Great Lakes, so from Lake St. Clair you can literally get to any body of water in the world. Where you go is only limited by your imagination and your budget.

We live in one of the most concentrated boating areas in the country—which is anchored by the Nautical Mile in St. Clair Shores.

Boating Lifestyles

Cruisers are advanced boaters that travel on their boats. This includes both power and sail boats. Some travel great distances, such as doing the "Great Loop" (Google that one). Cruisers often use a boat similar to the way people use RV campers on the highway. For obvious reasons, Cruising requires greater preparation, and more advanced equipment. Continued....next page

Day boaters are people that generally don't sleep on their boat. They use their boat during the day and return to their slip. Day boaters ski, wakeboard and often anchor their boat in shallow waters and swim and party with other boaters. On a warm summer weekend you'll find thousands of boats anchored in the shallows. Popular spots are Art Van's (north of the GP Yacht Club, in front of Art Van's former estate), Anchor Bay (near MacRay marina), the river shallows near the mouth of the St. Clair River (Strawberry & Gull Islands and Big Muscamoot Bay are popular spots). Our own Kerby Cove (small cove between Pier Park and Crescent Sail Club) is a small, but popular day boater anchorage. I would categorize myself as a day boater with cruising aspirations. We have done a number of longer overnight trips, including a visit to the North Channel last summer—which is one of the premier destinations on the Great Lakes (I'll talk about that trip in a future article). In fact, we acquired my current boat in order to make longer trips more feasible. Most of the fun of Cruising for me is in the preparation and the journey-sort of a "man vs. nature" thing.

There is a third style of boating lifestyle that I'll refer to as the **Harbor-Cottage crowd**. These folks generally leave their boat in the harbor and visit it on weekends—like an up-north cottage. Sometimes these boaters will establish a community and build elaborate decks, picnic areas and tiki-huts on the docks. I know boaters that drive every weekend to the Cedar Point marina because they love the harbor community that they've established there.

The one common element to all boaters is fun and recreation. Boating is fun, and it builds friendships and community. I hope you enjoy this column and if you have any ideas for a future column, please let me know.
